2006-2007 Career and Technical Education

- ◆ State approved CTE programs are organized by the six career pathways, which include all 16 national career clusters
- ◆ 11,859 students participated in 212 capstone/cooperative education programs
- ◆ Districts or regions without sufficient enrollment to run a full program at the high school level may be approved for Less-Than-Class-Size programs
- ◆ 66 LTCS programs were offered in 14 CEPDs, enrolling 243 students
- ◆ 555 students participated in CTE programs for juvenile offenders
- ◆ 24 students received Breaking Traditions Awards — 2 Recognition Awards, 10 Merit Awards, and 12 Certificate Awards.
